Who is served?




• Serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools

 Schools quality for Title I funding based on a census for unemployment. The last one was in 2010. Census is typically taken every 10 years.

 Students who receive services are those who show an academic need.

How long will my child receive services?



At the end of each marking period, student progress will be reviewed.

➢ If a child continues to struggle or is improving with the help of the interventions in place, he/she will continue to receive services.

If a child has made significant improvements and the parent and principal agree that these services are no longer necessary, parents will be notified.

Using Title I Funds



•Supplement vs. Supplant

➤ The federal supplement not supplant provision requires that federal funds be used to augment the regular educational program. They must not be used to substitute for funds or services that would otherwise be provided during the time period in question. The statute requires that state and local educational agencies (EA's and LEA's) cannot use these federal funds to supplant funds that would, in the absence of Title I funds, have been spent on Title I students (Title I, Part A, Section 1120A(b))
