Dear Parents,

The term "<u>Summer Slide</u>" is used to describe the tendency for students, to lose some of the achievement gains they made during the previous school year. It's no secret that kids read less during summer than they do during the school year. In fact, the average child reads just six hours over summer vacation! Fortunately, research points to summer reading as a powerful solution for preventing summer slide!



Throughout this letter I have listed strategies and fun ways to help the students sustain their reading and math skills during the summer and beyond! Please take the time to read this information and set up some things that you feel you can manage that will also help your children return to school ready to learn new things!

Summer Reading



We would like to have a **Book Swap on Monday**, **June 18th**. We are asking each student to bring in one or two gently loved books and they will come home with one or two choices from those that other students brought in. A great way to get a jump start on summer reading!

Read something every day: Encourage your child to take advantage of every opportunity to read.


- Morning: The newspaper even if it is just the comics or today's weather.
- Daytime: Schedules, magazines, online resources, etc.
- *Evening:* End the day by having your child read to you from the book he/she is currently reading. Have them rehearse a paragraph, page, or chapter before reading to you. Rereading will help them be more fluent; able to read at an appropriate speed, correctly, and with nice expression.

Keep reading aloud: Reading aloud benefits all children. One benefit is that you can read books your child can't, so they will build listening comprehension skills with grade-level and above books. This will increase their knowledge and expand their experience with text, so that she will do better when they read on their own. It's hard to keep up a reading routine in a season packed with distractions and diversions. These suggestions will fit into a busy schedule and make reading fun!

Suggested Summer Reading Lists

We have attached suggested book lists from the Media Center, for your use during the summer. We hope you will use these lists to encourage your child to read during the summer. Please look at the various selections and help your child make suitable choices. Summer is a time for reading for enjoyment, the books selected should be "Just Right Books!" Books which are too difficult may discourage young readers. Take this into consideration when guiding your child in his/her summer

reading selections. Remember visiting the Little Silver Library is a great summer activity, especially on those rainy days! There are some fun bookmarks and Bingo cards attached to this letter to make this even more fun!



4th grade students moving to Markham, do not forget the Restart summer reading book, Tuesday Book Talks and Google Classroom Assignments! Students entering fifth grade are required to read Restart and one additional book this summer. Visit the <u>Markham Place Media Center Website</u> for more information!



Author Barbara Dianis suggests, "Remember math fact fluency, in all four operations, enables students to recall math facts accurately, quickly and effortlessly. Achieving automaticity with facts enables them to retrieve facts for long-term memory without conscious effort or attention. In turn, this frees up working memory which students can devote to problem solving and learning new concepts and skills." Furthermore, "summer is an ideal time for students of all ages to strengthen their math academic skills while still having plenty of time left over for summer activities. Working on just three to four math problems per day during the summer can prevent students' mathematical skills from getting rusty! Students can look at it as a daily challenge that they must complete, or a daily "to-do" to proudly check off their calendar." The Little Silver School District Curriculum Department, working collaboratively with the staff at Point Road School, has developed a list of suggested resources and activities to combat summer slide. Please note that summer work while <u>not required is highly recommended</u>.



Some fun things to do that involve math!

Ice cream combinations: Try this one on a hot afternoon or evening when you could all use a couple scoops. How many different ways are there to get two scoops, when there are 11 flavors available? How do you know? Let them draw a picture to show you. Let them find a colorful way to keep track of all of the possibilities! Then reward them with a trip to the ice cream palor! Watch out for this, sooner or later: "What if we got three scoops?"

Free range data: Most kids live in an area where they are allowed to roam, even if it is only between a few houses! What do they know about the block they live on and how can they show it? How many windows are on the block, and how many front doors? What's the average number of students per household? Capitalize on what they like to do: running around, playing detective and getting creative. Ask them to draw picture graphs or summary sheets using whatever they have in their math toolbox!

Story teller logic: Maybe you have a child who loves inventing stories, characters, towns. Why not ask them to add some reasoning, and create their own logic puzzle?

Road trip number sense: An hour or two on the road, and you hit traffic. That peace-making electronic device is down for the count, and if you hear, "When will we be there," one more time you feel like you might scream! How about practicing some math skills! There are many license plates! Pick a target number and have kids race to find a license plate that can make that, using the numbers and any operations. Target number is 24? 6 + 2, times 3, for the win! Can they tell you where the parentheses go, in the order of operations?

Splashy, wet liquid volume: The beach, the pool, the garden hose: what do they have in common? They all captivate and mesmerize children for hours on end. Add an empty plastic pint glass, a gallon jug, a spare beat up measuring cup, and-voila! An instant learning lab for exploring <u>liquid volume</u>. Add a couple tall and skinny containers, and let kids play!

Basic Facts: You can put those flashcards into your beach bag or even a deck of cards and use them to practice facts! It is important to remember that the only way to learn facts is to memorize them!

We want our students to come back to school in fall ready to show growth. And nothing sets a them up for math growth better than a burning love of math!



As we approach the end of the school year and begin our summer, I'd like to remind you of some great online resources that your child can access in an effort to keep their skills sharp. All of the online programs offer a variety of lessons and activities for them to choose from. If you do not have internet access at home, please keep in mind that the Little Silver Public Library has internet access which your child can use. We are fortunate to be able to offer access to our online subscriptions over the summer! Attached to this letter, please find information from Ms. Orrick on how to access these online resources during the summer.



Once again, we are fortunate to have been able to add several new items to the Outdoor Courtyard! Each summer we have families volunteer their time to help maintain this space over the summer months and we would like to once again ask for families to volunteer one time period, during the summer, to help us water, weed, feed the fish, "dead head" the flowers and general clean-up. Your time will pay dividends for the entire school as we maintain this amazing outdoor classroom. Google Drive

Since Point Road has fully implemented the Google platform, all students in grades kindergarten through fourth have a Google account. Students use their Google/Chrome login and password to access their Google Drive (this login information is the same if not similar to the login they use for specific sites such as Reading Eggs, IXL, etc.).

If your child decides to access his or her Google Drive over the summer, they can do so by visiting the main Google site and logging into their account. Students in first and second grade may need assistance logging in since they are not accustomed to having to type in the **@littlelsilverschools.org** portion of their username. Please note, that your child's Google Drive contains assignments and projects from the past several years depending on what grade your child is in. These projects and assignments are part of their digital portfolio and should not be erased or altered.

Please also note that if your child wishes to create an original project of their own using Google, they must do so on a personal account/drive. **The school Google drive is strictly for school use only!!** Students are **NOT ALLOWED** to upload any information from home to this drive in order for us to make sure that all content that is being utilized in school is appropriate for our school age students. If you should have any questions about the District technology policy, please refer to the Little Silver Public Schools AUP Policy you and your child signed at the beginning of the school year.

Typing Club

Typing Club is the main program that we use for typing practice in grades second through fourth. All students are encouraged to utilize this program over the summer. The site is not a game, but a tool that supports correct use of hand placement and also helps students increase speed and accuracy. Students really enjoy using this program and seeing the progress they make as they earn stars and master levels.

Typing Jets/Cup Stacking/Keyboard Zoo/Keyboard Climber

These are games/programs that we use for kindergarten and first grade typing practice. They can be accessed by clicking on the following links:

<u>Typing Jets</u> <u>Cup Stacking</u> <u>Keyboarding Practice</u> Keyboard Climber

First grade uses all four programs; however, kindergarten uses mostly Keyboard Climber. Some kindergarten students may choose to use Cup Stacking; however that game requires more speed and accuracy. Kindergarten and first grade students are encouraged to use whatever program is most comfortable for them.

IXL, Reading Eggs/Reading Eggs Express, Raz Kids and Spelling City

These online academic resources cover a variety of skills including math, reading/language arts, and spelling. <u>Reading Eggs and Reading Eggs Express</u> are used by kindergarten and first grade students. <u>Spelling City</u> is used by first, third and fourth graders, <u>IXL</u> is used all grades, and <u>Raz Kids</u> is also used by all grades.

Students enjoy using these sites and have benefitted from them academically. In addition to online academic based sites, there are also sites that are game based and do not require a login or password such as Color with Leo, AbCya!, and many others found on the Porta Portal.

We hope that you will encourage your child to take advantage the many online resources available to them and practice their skills over the summer months.






